

and also Guardian. minor children of the
late John and Rebecca Harden. John
Harden was a late Private in Co. "D"
84 Ind Vols. Present Post Office address
of Frank Harden is Somerset, Wabash
Co. Ind.

This claim was submitted to me
for special examination for the purpose
of determining the soldiers physical con-
dition at, and prior to enlistment, and
at date of his discharge and thereafter,
to his death. Also to ascertain from Dr.
Charles S. Ellis, whether his statements

States means of knowledge, appears unbiased.

he was troubled with a fever and Camp
disease, Does not remember as to lung trouble.

time. Testifies as to condition in Nov 1868,

knowledge of the dates of births or dates of deaths of any of the surviving children. believes that Rebecca Harden the mother in her declaration for pension has stated the correct dates of birth of children. States her means of knowledge. Appears unbiased. Reputation good.

Matthew M. Ray. Testifies that she was acquainted with Harriet Harden daughter of the late John & Rebecca Harden for about two weeks before her death. which occurred on or about the 1st of Jan. 1869. States means of knowledge, Unbiased.

Frank Harden. Guardian & Claimant. States that he has no further evidence to offer and is satisfied with the examination

I saw a number of other comrades who had served in the same Co. & Regt with John Harden. among whom was Dr. T. C. Kimball now President of the Bd. of Examinining Surgeons at Marion Ind. Dr. Kimball, with others remembered.

Mr. Harden, and that he was sick and

complaining during the spring of 1862, that he had a cough, and was deaf. I called to see William and Asa Ross, Andrew Robinson John Houser & Abraham Miller. But did not find them at home. Ezekiel Rogers who had made several affidavits in the case, I found to be deceased, I therefore procured the testimony of other neighbors who had known the family of John Harden for as long a time as the absent parties. I also called upon Dr. Laughlin O'Neal, of Somerset, and Dr. Daniel Stradley of Wabash. And, but they stated that they had never treated Mr. John Harden or any member of his family. Dr. O'Neal, stated that he remembers Mr. Harden, and that it was said that he died of Consumption after he came home from the war. From what I could learn, the family of Mr. Harden were in very destitute circumstances during the last year of his life and the widow in her efforts to care for the dependent children fell a victim to disease, and death, leaving her little ones orphans, and to the cold charity of the Poor House. A sad picture but a true one. From the evidence before

one I am of the opinion that the claim
is one of merit and that it should be ad-
mitted without further delay. And though
I could not find any one that could
testify to the date of birth of the girl Harriet.
or the exact date of birth of the boy Ohmael.
I believe from what I could learn of the
Mother, Rebecca Harden, that the date of
birth of her children as she has them stated in
her declaration for pension, to be the correct
dates. From the testimony taken and information
obtained. I feel convinced that John Harden
died on the 8th of Aug. 1864. That Rebecca Harden
his wife died ^{on} the 9th of Aug. 1865. That
Charles Harden, the son died on the 10th or 11th
of June, 1866, and that Harriet Harden the
daughter died on the 1st or 2nd of Jan, 1869.
I find it is the opinion of Mr. Harden's old
comrades and neighbors, those that I saw,
that the claim should have been admitted
long ago.

A I am I am his son. Also made application for
 pension April 15th 1878 as guardian of Hector George
 Harden and Deborah Harden who with myself
 are the only surviving children of John and
 Rebecca Harden who were not sixteen years of
 age when our father died.

Q When and where did your father die and of what
 disease.

A He died. I think from what I can learn on the 8th of Aug
 1864 - near Somerset Wabash Co Ind - and of lung disease.

Q Where and when did he contract this disease.

A I have always understood that it was contracted
 while in the service, and I think in the year 1862.
 What was his conclusion when he came home
 from the army.

A He was not able to do anything, and coughed a
 good deal - confined to his bed shortly after he
 came home.

Q Who was his attending physician during his sickness
 and what physician was present when he died.

A I believe that Dr. Charles J. Ellis attended him while
 he was sick - Dr. Ellis was there a day or two before

he died but was not present when he died, but I think John Oyer and Joseph Jones were present at least they desired him and said him out for burial.

Q Who was your family physician before your father's enrollment?

A Dr. Charles Ellis.

Q Who were some of your near neighbors who would know as to your father's health before he enlisted?

A Abner Sitman, Asa Ross, Jacob Ully, and John House.

Q Who would know as to his condition after his discharge?

A The same parties whose names I have given and John Oyer and Joseph Jones.

Q Was your mother living at the date of your father's death?

A She was.

Q Did she ever make an application for pension?

A She did - but it was not settled before her death.

Q Did she again marry?

A No Sir;

Q Who is then that knew her intimately and knows that she remained a widow?

A The same parties whose names are given. On her application for pension did she also make application for the increase for minor children?

A I think that she did & have been so informed. Please state the names of all the surviving children that were under sixteen years of age at the date.

- Q. Are all of the above named children still alive?

- A. They are not all alive.

 When did your mother die and who was her attending physician in her last illness.

- A. As far as I can learn she died on the 12th of Aug 1865 - and her attending physician was Dr Charles Ellis.

- Q. Do you any record of her death and burial?
 A. I know of none other as can be obtained from the undertakers, Henry Lasher and the doctor and neighbors.
 Q. On your affidavit date of June 10th 1879 you make the statement that the dates of birth and ages of children of John & Rebecca Hascen are given by you as recorded in the Family Record owned and kept by your father and recognized as the records of the family. See on page 16 Exhibit "A".

affidavit made by you date of Nov 26th 1882. You claim
that you are unable to find any records. How do you
explain these apparent discrepancies.

I can only give this explanation. That when I made
the affidavit date June 10th 1879 the statements were
made from my own recollection of the records as seen
by myself in the family Bible - and from what knowledge
my aunt Mrs. Lizzie Jackson possessed. After my mother's
death this Bible went into the hands of my father's sister
then Lydia Harden afterward marriage to a Wallace Jackson.
And when the affidavit was made date of Nov 26th 1882
I was unable to get the Bible as it was in the hands
of my aunt Mrs Lydia Jackson then at Mayette Kansas.

On what were your father's family records kept and who
had charge of them after your mother's death?

They were kept in the family Bible - and after my
mother's death the Bible went into the hands of my father's
sister - as stated above.

Who is this Family Bible now - and who has charge of it?
I do not know where it is now. The last of Nov
1882 after I had made the affidavit date of Nov 26th
I made up my mind that I would try and find
the Bible up - and went over in search of it but
found that my aunt Mrs Jackson had separated
from her husband and was then in a dying
condition at her brother Henry Harden near
Huron Kansas. That her husband had made
away with every thing they had and that she
had no knowledge of what had become of the
Bible - and I could get no trace of it.

2 On the affidavit of Lydia Rogers date of June 9th 1879
 He gives date of birth of your brothers and sister. but
 says the reason they cannot get the exact date of
 births of all the children is that the paper containing
 the record is in the hands of Lydia Jackson of
 Maysville Kansas who will not send the record
 On this fact

A It is a fact that she had had the records & had written
 for them to send one the letter or a copy of the records
 but my aunt was sick and Mr Jackson prevented
 her from sending either one.

2 On your mothers Declaration for Pension Filed Sept 80th
 1864 she claims that you were born Feb 14th 1859. On
 your Affidavit made June 10th 1879 you say that
 you were born Feb 17th 1854. On an affidavit
 made by you Nov 26th 1882 you state that you
 were always informed by your father and mother
 that the date of your birth was Feb 14th 1859.
 Lydia Rogers in Affidavit date of June 9th 1879 also
 states that you were born on the 17th of Feb 1854.

How do you reconcile these conflicting statements.

A I believe that my mothers statement as to my
 age made by her in the application for pension
 is the correct one and any other statements that
 have been made by myself or others have been
 made under wrong impression or ideas of the dates
 and facts in the case.

On your Mother's application she claims that your brother Hector T. Harden was born July 14th 1858. On your Declaration as Guardian filed April 28th 1878 you claim that he was born July 4th 1857 and in your affidavit made June 10th 1879 you give the same date. Then in Affidavit dated Nov 26th 1882 you say that you believe that the statement made by your aunt Lincoln Buckins was by a clerical error made to say July 4th 1857 when in truth she meant as you believe to state the time to be July 14th 1858. That you had always been informed that the correct date of your brother Hector Tracy's birth to be July 14th 1858. Lincoln Buckins in her affidavit dated Dec 10th 1879 Testifies that Hector Tracy Harden was born July 4th 1857 and Ezekiel Rogers in affidavit dated of June 9th testifies that your brother Hector Tracy was born July 4th 1857. Please explain these conflicting statements and if you have always understood your brother was born on the 14th of July 1858 why you have twice made the statements under oath that he was born on July 4th 1857.

It was my understanding that he was born on the 14th of July 1858 but suppose that I was overruled when I made the statements referred to by what I could learn from others and now wish it understood that I consider the date of Hector Tracy birth as given by my mother in her Declaration to be the true date.



Instructions.

The affiant should state in his own handwriting these facts following:

1. The length of time he has been practicing medicine.

2. Whether, or not, he knew the soldier before enlistment. If he did know him, for how long a period he knew him, how intimately, with what opportunities of understanding, his physical condition, (as for example, by practicing in his family or otherwise,) and what his opinion is, as to said soldier's soundness at enlistment, adding, if true, that he was sound, and that he was so knowing of his physical condition that had he been unsound in any way he would have known it.

3. If he treated the soldier during his enlistment, either as his regimental surgeon or while he may have been at home on furlough, state his physical condition at such times, the nature and duration of his disability, and the dates of treatment.

4. Whether he has treated said soldier since his discharge. If he have, he should state—

(1) At about what date he first treated him.

(2) What his physical condition was when he first treated him, giving a full description or diagnosis of his disability.

(3) The period during which he has treated him.

(4) The dates, as nearly as he can, of his prescriptions.

(5) The extent to which he has been able to perform manual labor.

(6) To what extent, if any, his wounds, injuries, or diseases have yielded to treatment.

(7) Whether his wounds, injuries, or diseases have been aggravated or prolonged by intemperate or other bad habits.

In cases of injuries and diseases, the Commissioner of Pensions requires Medical Evidence of the physical condition of the soldier from the date of discharge to the present time. Physicians in making affidavits to disabilities to disability from injury, rheumatism, consumption, or other incurable diseases, need not regularly and continuously have prescribed for said soldiers from time of discharge to the present. It is sufficient that they have treated them from time to time or have given them professional advice, and so have gained full knowledge of their physical condition.
